The Hamilton County 4-H intern will work in cooperation with the Hamilton County 4-H Professionals to develop, enhance and pilot Agri-STEM programs for underserved youth in Hamilton County. Through existing relationships, the intern will teach in selected programs in high poverty schools, develop relationships with community partners and highlight successes in public venues like the Hamilton County Independent Community Fair. The intern will work primarily with youth but will also provide ongoing professional development in cooperation with the Hamilton County 4-H Professionals to educators and administrators. The intern will keep future career opportunities at the forefront when planning all activities and work to develop linkages between lessons and future careers.

The intern will:

- a) In cooperation with the 4-H professionals, provide Agri-STEM lessons to summer school youth at Rothenberg Preparatory Academy.
- b) In cooperation with the 4-H professionals and Cincinnati Parks, provide Agri-STEM lesson to summer camp youth.
- c) Develop a guide with 10 Agri-STEM Activities and Career Linkages.
- d) Run a 4-H STEM Experience Zone at the Hamilton County Independent Community Fair.
- e) Coordinate with the 4-H professionals to develop a Maker Space at the Hamilton County Fair.
- f) Coordinate the Innovation Station days with the Hamilton County Extension Staff working across program areas to ensure that STEM careers are highlighted in all program areas.
- g) Attend meetings with the Greater Cincinnati Environmental Educators.
- 7. Briefly describe the length of experience of the educator who will mentor the intern and/or the experience of the supervising educator/county team members. Our goal is to ensure the intern has a meaningful educational experience in which the intern learns the value and contribution of the Extension system and the impacts we produce for our clientele.

The Intern will be supervised by Tony Staubach, the Extension Educator, 4-H Youth Development. Tony has worked for Ohio State University Extension for nearly 5 years and has overseen interns in the past. Tony previously served as the Program Manager with 4-H Agri-Science in the City and as the Interim County Extension Director. Tony currently provides programming supervision to the new 4-H Program Assistant with 4-H Agri-Science in the City. Before serving with Ohio State University Extension Tony managed a staff of 8 AmeriCorps VISTA members and 25 student employees with the Wilmington College, Grow Food Grow Hope project and oversaw the development, execution and evaluation of the Health and Human Services and Corporation for National and Community Service grants that funded that initiative. Tony, by training, is a teacher and policy analyst who has taught youth from PreK to College Seniors. He is a well-established professional who is known throughout Greater Cincinnati for his creativity and hard work.
